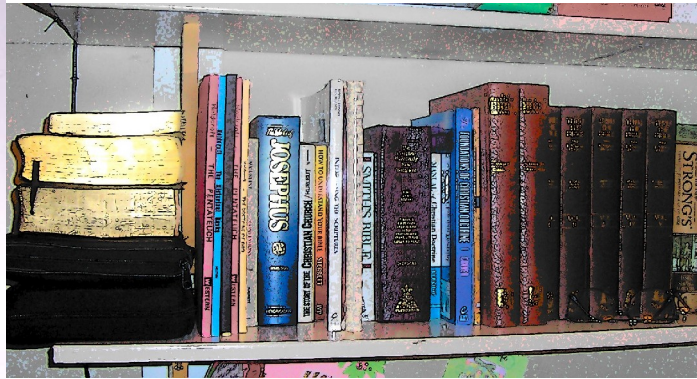

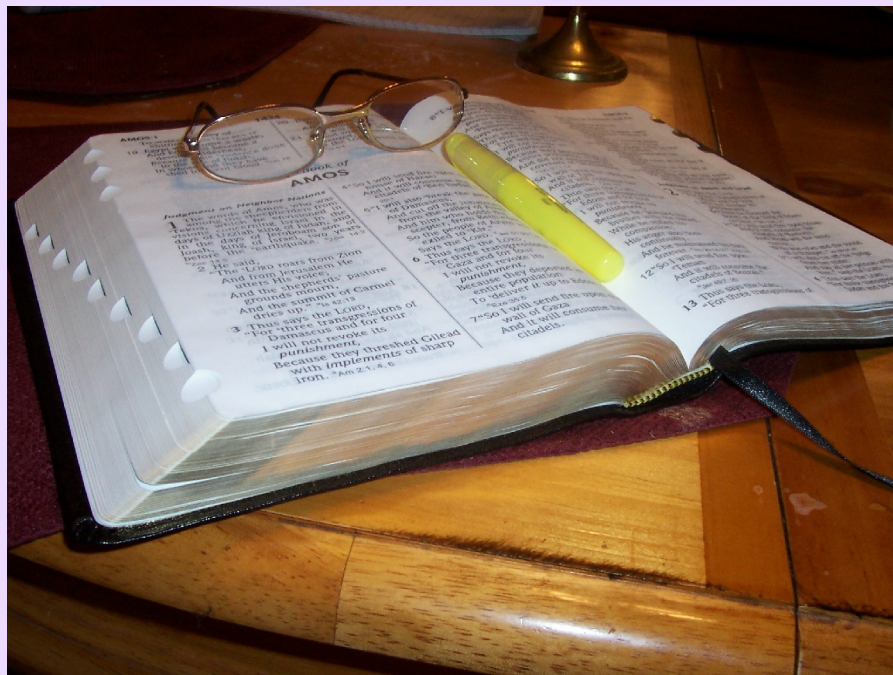

Course Offering Sequence Full Curriculum Bachelor Master Doctoral

A Bachelor Degree can be achieved in two ways:

1. Associates degree plus 64 credits at the seminary
2. Bible exam and Christian Ministry experience plus 64 Credits of seminary work.

Online Courses:

These courses are five week courses of intense everyday participation. They equal 4 credit hours of seminary class work. The courses are taken in sequence. There are a maximum of eight five week courses in a year and the student can take two courses per five week class no more than twice per year (not recommended).

The sequence of courses for year one is as follows:

1. Systematic Theology I
2. Church History I
3. Eschatology I
4. Biblical Theology I
5. New Testament I
6. Biblical Hermeneutic I
7. Apologetics I
8. Biblical Counseling I

The sequence of courses for year two is as follows:

1. Christology
2. The Holy Spirit
3. The Reformation and Modern Church History
4. Old Testament I
5. The Tabernacle and Temple
6. Homiletics I
7. Comparing Theology's
8. The Church in the World

Masters Degree Program will consist of 64 credit hours above a bachelor. Fifty-six (56) credit hours will be classes and eight credit hours will be a thesis of a minimum of 12,000 words or roughly thirty double-spaced type written pages. There will be eight five week classes of four credit hours each in a school year or thirty two credits. The thesis will begin at the first of the second year and go on through until completed.

The sequence of courses for the Masters Degree, year one, is as follows:

3. Biblical Theology and Redemptive Historical Hermeneutic
4. The Pauline Epistles
5. The Major Prophets
6. Advance Biblical Counseling

The sequence of courses for the Masters Degree, year two, is as follows:

2. Redemption Types in Scripture

4. Advanced Eschatology

The Doctoral Program will consist of sixty-four (64) credit hours beyond a Master's Degree. Fifty-two (52) credit hours will be in class work and twelve credit hours will be a dissertation of 25,000 words or roughly 60 double-spaced type written pages. The dissertation will be started half-way through the first year of study and completed at the end of the second year.

Bachelor's Degree Course Description

Fall 2005

Introduction To Exegetics & Hermeneutics: This course will explore the various methods of interpreting scripture. It will begin with a booklet called "Rightly Dividing the Word." It will continue with a text book called How to Understand Bible by T. Norton Sterrett. It will be driven by the statement of Jesus in John 5:39-40.

Introduction to Systematic Theology: This course will explore the systematic theology and emphasize the various doctrines. The Text book is the Manual of Christian Doctrine by Louis Berkhof.

Introduction to Biblical Theology: This course will view the bible from the redemptive-historical hermeneutical lens. Text will be Essential Questions; Discovering the Apostles' Doctrine by Joseph Machuta.

Introduction to Eschatology: This course will view all of the eschatological position developed over the history of the church. It will include a look at the various millennial positions found in each system.

Apologetics I & II: This course will explore the ability to give an answer to the hope that lies within the believer. It will survey the general area of apologetics.

The Creeds of the Church: This class will look at the various creeds of the church and compare them to the proof texts of each. Westminster Confession of Faith, the Remonstrants, the Canons of Dort et.al.

The Reformation and the 20th Century Church: This course will explore the history of the church since the reformation. It will look at the conditions and dynamics in the development of Protestantism.

Introduction to Church History: This course will explore the history of the Christian Church from the Apostles to the 1970's. Students will examine the positions of various Christian thinkers by examining their writings. This will be a survey course that will look at various epochs of Christian history examining the notable events and creeds.

Homeletics: This course will examine different types of preaching. Students will contrast expository preaching with "proof text" preaching. Each of the sermons in the book of Acts will be analyzed. Likewise, sermons of great preachers throughout history will be examined and discussed. The topics of discussion will be individuals such as Spurgeon, Dr. King, Dr. Ironsides, Martin Luther, and George Whitfield, to name a few. Preaching Style will also be examined.

Dispensationalism/Covenant Theology: This course will examine the theology and exegetics behind three different theological systems; Dispensationalism, Covenant Theology, and New Covenant Theology. Students will work with text books as well as internet material. The places where they are in agreement will be examined as well as the places where they differ.

Exegetics/Hermeneutics II: This course will be a continuation from the introductory course. The introductory course will be a prerequisite to taking this course. The debate between Augustine and Pelagius will be examined. We will look at Calvin, Luther, Arminius

Old Testament: This course is an introduction to the Old Testament. It will be examined by its various major divisions; the Pentateuch, the Poetry and Wisdom books, The Major Prophets and the Minor Prophets. It will be an over all survey of the Old Testament.

Church and the Community: This course will explore and define the role of the church in the community at large. There will be a discussion of social programs that the church can administer to the needy, the disenfranchised, the broken hearted, and the bound of our communities.

The Pastor in the Church: This course will look at the multifaceted duties of the shepherd. Being an overseer or a pastor is much more than preaching on Sunday and conducting bible study and prayer services.

New Testament: This course will be an introduction to, and an over view of, the New Testament. It will be examined by its various divisions; the Gospels, the Acts of the Apostles, the Epistles, and the Apocolypse. The occasion and recipients of the epistles will be examined as well.

Evangelism: This course will survey the biblical mandate to the church for evangelism. It will examine practical techniques for implementing this mandate. It will provide training skills to equip a person to develop an evangelistic plan.

Counseling/Biblical Perspective: This course is designed to provide the pastor or minister the skills to counsel from a biblical perspective. The text book will be Competent to Counsel by Adams.

Early Church Fathers: This course will examine the writings of the Early Church Fathers. This will include but not be limited to Clement, Tertullian, Ignatius, Origen, The Shepherd of Hermas, and The Didache. Much of this material is available on the internet.

Exegetics Independent Study NT: This course will provide the student with the opportunity to conduct and share independent study. Each student will be assigned to write a commentary on the New Testament book of their choice. They will then share their writings with the other students in the class. The sharing will be in the form of an oral presentation.

Christ in the Scriptures: This course will survey the figures and types of Christ in the Old and New Testament. It will also touch on the Pre-incarnate Christ, the visitation of the "Angel of the Lord" and "Melchizedek the King of Salem." Likewise, Christ of the gospels, the risen Lord, and the Christ of the book Revelation.

The Reformation: This course will examine the reformation from a variety of angles; the circumstances that led to reformation, the thinkers that brought about the reformation. The theology that caused the reformers to splinter into various groups. It will also look at the men of the reformation such as, Luther, Calvin, Zwingli, Menno Simmons, and John Knox.

Comparative Religions: This course will be a survey of the worlds major religions. It will compare Christianity with Judiasm, Buddhism, Islam, and Hinduism.

Exegetics Independent Study OT: This course will provide the student with the opportunity to conduct and share independent study. Each student will be assigned to write a commentary on the Old Testament book of their choice. They will then share their writings with the other students in the class. The sharing will be in the form of an oral presentation.

New Covenant Theology: This course will explore and examine the main points of "New covenant Theology." This study takes the position that the new covenant is distinct and separate from the Old Covenant and that it is in full force today.

Revelation: This course will examine Revelation Chapter by Chapter and verse by verse. The four basic interpretational approaches will be discussed and examined, that is, the Allegorical, The Preterist, the Historical, and the Futurist as they relate to doctrines of eschatology.

Homeletics II: This course will be a continuation of Homeletics I with the emphasis on personal preaching and sermon development. Each student will be assigned a book of the New and Old Testaments and will be required to develop sermons from them. These will be shared in group oral presentations of 3 to 7 minute sermonettes.

Exegetics Independent Study OT: This course will provide the student with the opportunity to conduct and share independent study. Each student will be assigned to write a commentary on the Old Testament book of their choice. They will then share their writings with the other students in the class. The sharing will be in the form of an oral presentation.

Ministerial Internship*: This is a course designed to allow the minister to do independent study in the field. It will be set up to work hand in hand with a local church.

Preaching - Evangelism - Missions: This course will examine the mandate for preaching the gospel and how this is connected with evangelism and missions. Who is responsible for evangelism and missions? It will also explore methods for implementing evangelism and missions in the church.

Introduction To Exegetics & Hermeneutics: This course will explore the various methods of interpreting scripture. It will begin with a booklet called "Rightly Dividing the Word." It will continue with a text book called How to Understand Bible by T. Norton Sterrett. It will be driven by the statement of Jesus in John 5:39-40.
